# NOTES FROM PASTOR DAVID

Dear Friends in Christ,

As you know, March is a month of transition, moving away (we hope!) from winter storms and the doldrums of still short days toward spring and the lengthening of days. We will set clocks ahead an hour, spring plants will begin to poke through the earth, and grass will green up. Along with changes in God's creation around us, you will also notice the change in church seasons as we begin the 40-day season of Lent with Ash Wednesday on March 5. Lent gives us the opportunity to think, reflect, and make changes to our lives, as we give up old routines and sacrifice those things that may hold sway over us while also taking up new rhythms and ways of serving others. Our theme for Lent this year is, "Everything in Between: Meeting God in the Midst of Extremes." Beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), the series flows through several familiar Biblical stories—The Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, The Fruitless Fig Tree, The Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. These scriptures reflect how Jesus' ministry was rooted in relationships that disrupted the established and extreme social, political, and religious divides of his time. This series is an invitation to navigate the polarities in our lives with more faith, intention, and openness to be transformed. In a divided world, we might find that God is present in between. Life is complex, unsettled, and stressful. So, let this season and these stories speak to you through worship, devotionals, learning, fellowship, and service as God meets us. As we begin, consider this prayer found in our Sanctified Art series:

God meets us in the night before the sun rises, before the wound heals, before there are answers. before there is closure. God meets us in the light where joy is effervescent, where laughter is contagious, where flowers bloom from cracks in the sidewalk, where people gather around tables. God meets us in betweenat the edge of the water, at the beginning of the wilderness, at the start of something new, on the edge of faith. And if God meets us in all those places, then surely God meets us everywhere at the water's edge, at the start of something new, after the baptism, and before the call.

We are not alone. God is all around.

Let us worship the God of everything.

I invite you to join with me and our faith community at Opequon as we worship, study, pray, serve, reflect, and give this Lent.

## PASTOR JULIA'S MUSINGS

Friends in Christ,

I waited until the March newsletter to share this, because I wanted to make sure I was actually going to stick with it. One of my biggest goals for 2025 was to increase my spiritual practices. I'm at a church every day, but I know that it's easy for me to get pulled in a million directions and not actually take intentional time to be with God.

As I was praying about what I want to do for the year, I reflected on how much I love study, but also on how I often times focus on other people's words. I discerned: why don't I go to the source and actually read the Bible again? This year, I have committed to reading the whole Bible, front to back, following the guide from The Bible Project. Each night, I will read a couple of chapters chronologically and a paired Psalm. The Bible Project also has articles and videos that go along. Here's the thing—I have not been perfect. I have fallen asleep before reading a couple of times and once I totally forgot. But there's grace in the process and I just catch up the next day.

So I wonder: what are your spiritual practices? What brings you closer to God? Maybe you find peace in walking and praying once a day. Maybe there is a devotional that you really enjoy. Maybe, you want to read the Bible more and found a program that works well for you. God is there all the time, but there is something powerful in pausing each day, naming God, studying the Word, and praying. It's a discipline that takes us out of the day, gives us a moment to pause, and centers us in what matters.

I'd love to hear more about what you do to grow closer with God, and how we can support each other in our own journeys.

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# PASTOR TRACIE'S JUST THINKIN'

Spring is generally a time when we sweep clean. We clean out drawers, scrub things we might have ignored over the winter, clean out leftover chaff from flower beds and pots. We sort and box, dust and scrub, sneeze and spray most everything

within our homes, desks, and closets. We wash windows, launder curtains, and poke corners. Nothing is disregarded.

What about our thoughts, however? How often do we check out our assumptions, clean out our baggage, or challenge our memes?

It occurs to me that the divisions of our current culture can make it harder to check in with ourselves. Am I being fair? Do "they" truly deserve all of that (whatever "that" might be)? Do I truly believe "that" to be true or do I just want it to be true? Did I take enough time to get the whole picture? Am I being realistic... fair... or am I simply reinforcing old assumptions?

I remember reading about a woman who always cut the first three inches from the family's Easter ham before baking it. She had done this most of her life. When asked why, she replied that her mother had always done that, and she simply continued the practice. When her mother was asked why she had always shortened hams, she replied that the only heavy baking pan she had was too short to hold a whole ham, so she cut the meat down to size and tucked the extra piece in. A larger pan ended the family's practice.

Then there is the old trope about the police officer who was heading home after a long, hard day on patrol. He had dealt with a whole succession of difficult people, and a mountain of frustrating paperwork. All he wanted at this point was to kick back, unwind, enjoy some peace and quiet, and maybe watch a few innings of baseball on TV. But, as he neared home, he was startled by a vehicle that came careening around a sharp curve and narrowly missed his squad car. As the car passed within a few inches of him, the other driver shouted "Pig!" The police officer was suddenly energized. He slammed on brakes, all set to turn his squad car around and head-off in hot pursuit. But, as he rounded the curve, ... he ran head-on into a large pig that was standing in the middle of the road!

Effective communication is far more complicated and difficult than we think. With barriers like cultural differences, personal "filters," different definitions, etc., it's amazing that any of us ever understand one another. Honest communication requires trust and taking risks. And we all have been burned, many times. So, obviously we settle for safety, make the natural assumption, and run head-on into our own version of that pig as we journey down life's highway!

There is a better way. A way that recognizes our similarities. A way that sees others as a source of community and healing. A way that looks past our

own frustration and previous disappointments to explore the possibility that even a "stranger" may have something positive to say. The Apostle Paul described it in Corinthians, chapter 13. It's the "higher way" of love. I almost hesitate to use that term these days because of the way our culture misuses it. But when you read Paul's description, try substituting "maturity." It's a perfect fit. The risks are higher for this way of living, but so are the rewards.

Another (anonymous) writer cautions: "To laugh is to risk appearing the fool. To weep is to risk appearing sentimental. To reach out to another is to risk involvement. To expose feelings is to risk exposing your true self. To place your ideas, your dream before a crowd is to risk their loss. To love is to risk not being loved in return. To live is to risk dying. To hope is to risk despair. To try is to risk failure. But risks must be taken, because the greatest hazard in life is risking nothing. Only a person who risks is free."

This doesn't mean we should be naive. It does mean we should be careful what we assume. Check it out. Give others the benefit of the doubt. Who knows, that approach could change our life. (Largely taken from Making Assumptions by Capt J. David Atwater, CHC, USN in Motivational Stories, Aug 12, 2013. Why? Because he said it better than I ever could.)

# SESSION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS FROM IANUARY & FEBRUARY 2025

- Session expressed thanks for the leadership and years of service given by 2024 outgoing Elders Steve Bock, Fran Jeffries, and Mike Wygant as they end their terms and to Ron Smith who begins his second term.
- stewardship & Finance Ministry: Financial reports for December and January were approved by Session in January and February, respectively. In January, Session approved the updated 2025 Giving Events Calendar and 2025 Offering Counters (Bob & Judy Gaines, Nancy Picklap, Paula Marquis, Carole Fox, Ray Jones, Tim Hoffman, Chris Williams, Susan Witt & Laverne Cooper). The annual 2024 review was completed in January with no issues.
- Technology & Communications Team: Incoming Elder Michelle Hammer now chairs the team. Goals for 2025 include conducting an inventory and developing a replacement plan for OPC's tech equipment, such as laptops. In February, OPC's new telephone system was installed, and

- a replacement livestream camera purchased (installation pending).
- Personnel & Administration Ministry: Session enthusiastically approved the recommendation to renew the contract with Parish Associate Tracie Martin for another year (April 1, 2025 to March 31, 2026). The need for a contracted cleaning/janitorial service to support Robert Sydnor after WATTS week is under discussion for 2025.
- Christian Education Ministry: Session approved the VBS Planning Team (Carole Witt, Rebekah Witt, Winter Brooks, Layne Link, Linda Shimer, and Melanie Palmer) and VBS curriculum (Compassion Camp: Changing the World with Loving Kindness); VBS is scheduled for June 16 -19, 2025.
- Deacons & Congregational Care Ministry: The Deacon Retreat on February 15, 2025, focused on setting goals for 2025. Additional volunteers to assist with transportation to/from medical appointments are needed.
- ∀ision Team: Regular meetings have been shifted to the 2nd Tuesday of the month. Video testimonials are being captured by Rick Ours for inclusion in the Capital Campaign Gala program on April 4.
- Capital Campaign: The Capital Campaign inaugural "A Place of the Table" leadership event was held in January. Future events include culmination of the Leadership Gifts phase with a Capital Campaign Gala/Celebration Dinner on April 4, 2025, at West Oaks Market and Event Center (6:00—8:00 PM) launching the Congregational Gift phase; and Dedication/Celebration Service, Sunday May 18, 2025. Watch for announcements.
- Mission Ministry: Session decided that the 10% tithe of total Capital Campaign funds raised be divided equally between four recipients of the Capital Campaign Mission Component grants (equal shares)—two global (Ethiopia Partnership with the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus (EECMY) & Romanian/NOROC) and two local Winchester mission projects (Family Promise of Winchester and Bright Futures of Winchester/Frederick County).
- Congratulations to Deacon Co-Chair, Winter Brooks, who also chairs the Virginia chapter of American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, and was awarded National AFSP Chapter of Year.
- Fellowship Ministry: Remember to get your photo taken by Debbie Bender or Alyce Callahan for the new Directory. Fellowship

- purchased five new titanium cutting boards. Efforts to expand the FEAST Groups program are underway—watch for future announcements.
- Buildings & Grounds Ministry: Thanks to Mike Crawford for his donation of a portable natural gas detector to the church. The livestream stage project began in late February with expected construction to be completed the end of March. The historical Memorial Sanctuary Lighting and Electrical project is expected to be completed by Spring 2025 before VBS begins.
- Get ready for SPRING at two upcoming March events: Opequon's Spring Cleaning Day, Saturday, March 22 (1st day of Spring), at 9:00 AM, and Mulch Madness, Saturday, April 5, at 9:00 AM.
- Discipleship: Session has appointed a 2025 REALM Subcommittee to focus on discerning members gifts and fostering engagement within the congregation. Vern Gamble brings IT expertise as chair, and Pastor Julia is the staff person assigned to work with the subcommittee.
- The annual Leadership Retreat is scheduled for Saturday, March 8, 2025. This year's theme is "Building a Bigger Table."
- Session approved the request for use of the sanctuary by the Lions Club to hold the annual Bland Music Contest on March 6 (4:00 PM). Session approved use of OPC's Picnic Shelter by Kernstown United Methodist to hold an outdoor Good Friday Service on April 18, 2025, at 7:00 PM.
- Session approved the Baptism of Camille Hartley Orndorff for Sunday March 30 at the 8:30 AM service.
- Session approved the wedding request from Jaclyn Mohlmann and Taylor Beaubien Jr. to use Memorial Sanctuary for their wedding, on September 20, 2025, at 2:00 PM.

Planning is the longest part of any building project. Right now, the Architectural Review Team is working with both the Balzer Architecture Group and KEE Construction, our cost estimating group, to get the specifications and details in place. There has been talk about how high the cathedral ceiling will be, what kind of air locks and doors will keep the cold out of the back entrance (have you felt the freezing wind of the last two weeks?), and making sure there is good space for our playground and recreation area.

There is a lot more going on behind the scenes as well. Capital Campaign teams are planning and organizing for the larger outreach this spring. The Prayer Team, for example, is bringing together prayers from many places to encourage and support us. 
Father God,



#### MISSION HIGHLIGHT

This month's Mission Highlight is from Rich Schempp and focuses on **CCAP**. Please join us in supporting this important mission:

CCAP was formed in October 1974. By 1975, it became the Congregational Community Action Project, considering itself a homeless prevention program, helping community people who are in crisis by providing support throughout the crises. CCAP has a food pantry, a clothing ministry, and offers financial aid in the form of small grants to pay utility bills, heating/fuel, rent, mortgage, and car repair. Its vision statement says: "Our neighbors can always count on the compassion and generosity of the community in times of need and will have meaningful opportunities to lift themselves out of difficult life situations."

OPC has been a part of CCAP since the beginning and currently provides support with a monthly collection of selected items and a gift of approximately 120 Thanksgiving Banana Boxes. In addition, there is a budgeted line item in the Mission budget for continued CCAP support. In 2024, CCAP served 6,402 households and 11,000 individuals. The clothing and baby/ toddler room distributed 77,207 diapers and 165,000 items of clothing. It assisted 1,081 households and 3,229 individuals in need of water, electric, and rent assistance. 494 households and 1.651 individuals received holiday distributions and 50 households and 120 individuals were delivered firewood. Volunteers donated more than 16.657 hours of their time in 2024. CCAP meets a vital need in the Winchester area and OPC's excited to be a part of its mission.

#### **GENEROSITY MOMENT**

(From Pastor Tracie Martin & the Generosity Team)

The end of February tells us that spring is imminent. It's been a wintery winter this year. We have had more snow than I remember seeing down here in 8 years—more ice, too. We have had to cancel, Zoom, and postpone events... even worship went to only streaming a few weeks ago! It's been brutal!

Thank God for a congregation that provides the church with what is needed to keep things going over a hard winter. Think about trying to get into the church building last month if we had run out of salt! Imagine the burst pipes and damage if we couldn't pay for heat. What if no one plowed or cleared the walkways or the front entrance?

I know it's hard to imagine a church without clear sidewalks, salted parking lots, or heat, but I am aware of congregations that had, and still have, exactly those concerns. For one, it was a matter of planning ahead. For another, it was discovered that the supply was out and no one replaced it. One larger congregation was caught short because only the pastor had ever thought to get to the church early enough to shovel. In each case, the panic was real and tempers were not always gentle before things were handled.

Absurdities happen everywhere... even churches. I remember one congregation I served early on, where no one would enter the church building until I arrived. Instead, they circled their cars in the parking lot, rolled down their windows and chatted. This was fun until I forgot my keys one Sunday. No one else had brought their keys, because I always had mine. There was momentary panic until Grandma Dykes revealed that she had hidden a key near the back door. Lesson learned!

We can laugh at all this nonsense because the OPC congregation has generously provided for emergencies—even absurd ones. We have contingency funds to cover broken HVAC units, a Building and Grounds Team and staff to fix things that go awry. Can you even imagine any situation when the key to the door would be missing as long as I (Tracie) am not the solo pastor at OPC? Water may spill; things may leak. Things may get stuck; switches may fail. A congregation as faith-filled and generous as ours, however, gets things done. Attitude... such a little thing that makes a big difference.

# What's on the Nutrition Facts Label?


In 2016, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) updated requirements for the Nutrition Facts label on packaged foods and drinks. FDA required changes to the Nutrition Facts label based on updated scientific information, new nutrition research, and input from the public. This was the first major update to the label in over 20 years. The refreshed design and updated information make it easier for you to make informed food choices that contribute to lifelong healthy eating habits. So, what changed?

Spring is coming, which will lead into SUMMER and that means Vacation Bible School time! We are already planning for those warm evenings of summer and VBS fun.


