

INFORMATION FOR OUR GUESTS


To get the most out of your visit, may we recommend you familiarize yourself with the following:

†POSTLUDE

NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

"Simple Gifts" was composed in a Shaker Community in Alfred, New York, circa 1848. For a hundred years, this compelling tune was little known outside a few tiny Shaker communities. Then Aaron Copeland used it as a ballet for Martha Graham in his composition, "Appalachian Spring." Copeland's treatment of the tune supplied the opening theme music for at least two network news shows. In the early 1960's Sydney Carter composed a new set of lyrics that begin "I Danced In the Morning." This simple American tune, turned contemporary hymn, was interwoven throughout the Irish-themed musical "Lord of the Dance." The Shaker text is timeless: "Tis the gift to be simple, 'tis the gift to be free. 'Tis the gift to come down where we ought to be, And when we find ourselves in the place just right, 'Twill be in the valley of love and delight." This morning's offertory is not a hymn or classical piece. It was introduced more than fifty years ago as a piece of popular music. Its text is certainly secular, yet it seems to reflect portions of John 15: "Love each other as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." Perhaps Paul Simon had John 15 in mind when he penned: "Like a bridge over troubled water, I will lay me down."

I stopped noticing bridges Reliable, familiar connections Over a highway or across a river Like two bridges I cross to Take my kids to school.

The givenness of bridges emerges from reliable, Sturdy paths: paved, smooth, familiar. Bridges planned and bridges built. Weeks and years of work. I'd taken the work for granted.

Building bridges is construction, Planning, upkeep, repair, and use. Stationary structures in constant motion: Stillness masks unceasing work To make connections safe.

Unsafe connections don't connect; Unsafe bridges can't bridge. Unsafe and uncertain, disconnected neighbors Remain across a highway Or on different shores of the same river.

Two people, two groups, two congregations, two neighborhoods Smiling or waving Risk-free coexistence replacing The work of building a highway crossing Or paths across a river.

These not-bridges, tenuous connections
Are less stable, less safe, less certain
Than sturdy bridges that took years to build:
People working together to make
Complacency the greatest risk.

Maybe we need to keep our distance, while we heal or learn or wait Maybe some bridges aren't ours to build, so we hope for other builders, other bridges.

Maybe coexistence is as close as we can get to compromise when past hurts haunt our present
Maybe we can only wave or smile because
we struggle to see God across the highway or the river.

Maybe smiles desire to connect when we can't connect all the way across Maybe waves are carefully considered confessions: we aren't sure if it's safe to connect at all.

Going to school or returning home Would be difficult without connections, Or without safety, If threats of harm challenged The promise of bridges.

We'd have to find another highway or risk traffic, Ford the river or risk being swept away, Or my daughters and I would wave As their friends and teachers wave back. Across unbridged divisions.

Maybe we'd wonder how to draw nearer Or maybe we'd accept distance As a natural part of the world we've built Where people work together to threaten Instead of building bridges.

Our world needs bridges: Trusted, sturdy, safe, Stronger than smiles or waves Or polite coexistence, but Bridges need unceasing work.

By human hands or by humans in God's hands Whichever makes unceasing work make sense, The job of the bridge-builders is becoming most difficult. But there are still highways and rivers, So there is still the promise of bridges.

And if there is still the promise of bridges,
There is still the promise of bridge-building,
There is still the possibility of safe connections,
There is stillness and unceasing work,
There is still hope.
